

Visualizing Data to Increase Access to Diapers



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What do Diaper Banks do?

- Obtain and distribute diapers
 and other sanitary products through a network of local partners
- Ensure all families have sufficient access to diapers and period products
- Advocate for key policy reforms like making diapers and period products taxexempt



Importance

- Diaper banks are the primary provider of diapers to those in need
- Lack of diapers limits families' ability to access childcare, go to school, and work
- Lack of diapers also negatively impacts the **health of children**

Our Data

- **Survey:** Economic Impact Study of Basic Needs Diaper Provision by Diaper Bank
- Conducted by The National Diaper Bank from 2019-2021 with 65 participating diaper banks across 29 states
- 6221 responses, 343 variables

Goals

- Provide diaper banks with insights on how to allocate existing resources more efficiently
- Communicate the economic impact of diaper banks to the government and public to increase funding and awareness
- Provide diaper banks with a better understanding of those they serve




Figure 1. Over half of diaper bank recipients drive themselves to diaper distribution sites, while almost a quarter receive diaper bank products at home.




Figure 2. The majority of families helped by diaper banks make below \$25,000 a year, while the majority of US families make above \$60,000 a year.

Distribution of Preterm vs Term Babies by Race or Ethnic Identity





Figure 3. The percentages of preterm babies across the different race and ethnic identities have relatively little variation.

Distribution of Education Type




Figure 4. The majority of surveyed adults undergoing education are either working towards an Associate's or in a job-training/non-degree program.




Filtering Choropleth
